Introduction to the University Libraries

Our mission is: The University of New Mexico Libraries is a dynamic leader in connecting customers to information, collections, and instruction anyplace, anytime, as well as providing and maintaining exceptional facilities for the evolving education, research and service needs of UNM and the wider community.

University Libraries (UL) serves the library and information needs for undergraduate and graduate students, students attending the University's Continuing Education classes and Evening and Weekend Degree Programs as well as faculty and staff.

The UL is comprised of four libraries: Centennial Science and Engineering Library, Fine Arts & Design Library, Parish Library for Business and Economics, and Zimmerman Library. Special collections are managed in the Center for Southwest Research & Special Collections located in Zimmerman Library.

System-wide the UL has approximately two million cataloged volumes, 20,000 print journals, 650,000 government documents, 13,000 linear feet of manuscripts and archives, 220,000 maps and cartographic images, 173,000 electronic books, 63,000 electronic journals and 3.8 million microform titles. The ULs's special collections include rare books, manuscripts, photos, music, art, posters, artifacts, and architectural plans.

The UL provides wireless connectivity and a laptops-for-loan program as well as over 300 desktop computers. We also have printers, copiers and microform readers to serve students' technology needs. Classrooms for library instruction are located in Zimmerman, Centennial, Parish, and the new Fine Arts and Design Library. Each library has a variety of quiet and group study options for students.

The UL Instruction Program offers classes and orientation sessions for UNM students and faculty on research strategies and tools, on the use of library collections, and on using the Web. Last year, the UL provided this essential tool for success to over 14,000 students. Students may also schedule individual appointments with subject specialists for in-depth research assistance.

Three outreach programs serve students, faculty, and related communities in areas of distinction: The Division of Iberian and Latin American Resources and Services (DILARES) is one of the major repositories of Latin American resources in the United States; the Indigenous Nations

Library Program (INLP) serves the information needs of UNM-based Native American students, communities and programs as well as outreach to New Mexico Tribal Nations; and the Chicano, Hispano, Latino Library Program (CHIPOTLE) serves the information, collections, and knowledge discovery needs of UNM programs, students and the larger community.

The UL also is the only Government Information Depository Library in the state of New Mexico and provides free access to millions of government reports and documents to community members. The Patent and Trademark Depository and Map and Geographic Information Center located in Centennial Library provide specialized resources and services.

Since its founding, UNM has provided library collections and services. The UL has grown with the University adding specialty branches in areas of strength for UNM. The UL has kept pace with student needs over the years and continues to do so moving more strongly than ever into the provision of electronic access and content. The UL has been a member of the prestigious Association of Research Libraries since 1979 and ranks 70 out of the 113 member libraries where 1 is considered the best.

Significant Accomplishments

Strategic Planning

The UL has identified four goals in its Strategic Plan for 2006-09 in order to continue the creation of a dynamic library system that plans for and responds to the evolving information and research needs of our students. They are:

1. Re-envision the University Libraries as a virtual space and revitalized physical places.
2. Evaluate and further develop customer-centered collections.
3. Integrate the University Libraries more deeply into the academic culture of UNM.
4. All University Libraries' employees are individually valued, understand how their role affects University Libraries' customers, and have the necessary tools and skills to succeed.

Dean Martha Bedard held a retreat for library managers and leaders in September 2007. The outcome of that retreat was a list of priorities that have guided the UL this year. They are:

Information & Service Initiatives

- **24/5 Services in Parish Library**--Spring 2008 student surveys sponsored by ASUNM and Anderson School of Management resulted in an overwhelming demand for 24 hour library services. Funding to support these additional services was provided by UNM 's administration and 24 hour/5 days a week services were implemented this fall. Library facilities were enhanced with new seating, additional computer stations, vending machines, and additional security. The new services were extensively advertised and usage studies show the new hours to be extremely popular with counts of up to 100 students in a typical day.
- **Virtual Services** such as electronic book collections and numerous new electronic databases and full text resources have been added this year to increase availability to students on a 24/7 basis. The UL now has nearly 110,000 electronic journals and nearly 136,000 electronic books searched by our patrons, accumulating over 2 million hits annually.
- **Ask a Librarian**, a new one-stop phone, instant messaging, and chat service was launched over the summer of 2008. Students make a single contact to get answers to any question, from technological to database issues to in-depth subject consultation insuring prompt and accurate help.
- **Libguides**
 - The UL adopted the *LibGuides*TM system for subject guides. In preparation for the fall 2008 semester guides were developed for all subject areas and for some specific programs and classes.
- **Google Scholar now incorporates selected UNM electronic content for 24/7 on and off campus access.**
- **Inter-Library Loan (Illiad)**, a customer-initiated, paperless, online interlibrary loan service, facilitates and tracks over 27,000 requests annually for books and articles not owned by the University Libraries. Over 4,900 Graduate students and 5,500 Undergraduate students are registered borrowers in the Illiad system. The average

turnaround time for electronic delivery of articles is 24-48 hours, with over half filled within the first 24 hours. The UL subsidizes all related costs.

- The Borrowing Section received a total of 27,323 requests during the year. It successfully filled 24,022 of these, for a fill rate of 90%.
 - The Document Delivery Service received a total of 1495 requests during the year. It successfully filled 1055 of these, mostly from our collection, for a fill rate of 70%.
 - The Lending Section received a total of 46,133 requests during the year. It successfully filled 18,209 of these from our collection, for a fill rate of 40%. Large numbers of requests continued to flow in from libraries within the state of New Mexico, including from smaller colleges and newer consortium members. Incoming requests are always processed the same business day.
- **Library Express** service was launched in August 2008 and provides “one-stop shopping” for all library requests. The service scans articles from our own collections and also pages books for student pickup. Most items are provided within one business day. The service averages over 500 requests per month, typically provided within one day.
 - **Electronic Class Reserves** system is a great success with both students and faculty and another example of the library providing services for the convenience of the UNM community. Over 800 classes were registered during the 2007-08 academic year with more than 1.1 million documents downloaded during the year. We continue to upgrade the technology infrastructure to ensure that the system is available 24 hours a day including holidays.
 - **Electronic Resource Management** tools. Two new modules have been fully implemented; the holdings module, from which the system generates the web pages students use to access online journals, and the linker, which finds full-text articles contained in the online journals. These modules work together to provide more robust access to online resources and are better at identifying discrete content elements and making them visible than the previous tools. These modules are the building blocks for additional enhancements, including Federated Search which is a comprehensive and easier to use search feature and new eBook functionality which will be fully implemented in Spring 2009.
 - **Satellite Services.** Reference outreach services located in Mesa Vista Hall continues to be popular for students. This year, the UL celebrated our partnerships with the student-success and diversity program located there drawing a large and representative group of students.
 - **Liaison Program.** UL librarian assignments have been reorganized and expanded to provide more subject expertise to each UNM department. The liaisons will focus on the interests, concerns, goals, and information needs of their client departments.
 - **Indigenous Nations Library Program (INLP) 2007-2008.** This program increased Native American Studies library holdings by 1031 titles including books, full-text

databases, archival microfilm sets, and audiovisual recordings. Program faculty and staff taught 34 instruction sessions attended by 563 students, responded to 614 reference questions, and arranged for six lectures attended by 219 students/faculty.

- **Purchase on Demand, for the faculty.** We purchased a total of 383 new books, totaling \$21,123.98, for an average cost of 55.15 per title, for addition to the collection.
- **Instruction:** In 2007/08, 43 library staff and faculty from throughout University Libraries taught 703 classes to 11,599 students.
- **Reference.** There were 25,709 reference interactions of all types in FY 0708 and 15 in-services.

Collections Initiatives

- The bound journal collection and extensive microformat collection was returned from storage after being removed and cleaned as a result of the fire. The majority of the journal collection lost in the fire has been replaced in either electronic, print or microformat. Work is still underway to locate replacements for the remaining journals lost in the fire.
- Over 60 electronic databases or journal packages were added during the year. Some databases were acquired in order to replace materials lost in the 2006 Zimmerman fire, such as the Black Studies Center, Foreign Broadcast Information Service Daily Reports, segments of Periodicals Archive Online, and new segments of JSTOR. Others, such as ArtSTOR and North American Indian Drama, were purchased with special allocations.
- The Print-to-Electronics Taskforce reviewed the journals published by over a dozen companies in order to identify journals that were candidates for electronic-only or print-plus-electronic access. Over 500 journals were transferred from the print format to electronic. We retained print format in some areas such as fine arts, anthropology and Latin American studies. We re-negotiated contracts where needed, and added UNM branch campus access where possible.
- Work to add access to electronic resources for our UNM branch campuses continued with great success. In 2005, we provided access to less than 50 databases; as of 2007, we provide access to almost 140. We have begun negotiating access for electronic journals as well even though access to some titles cannot be implemented until major work on the proxy system is done.

Technology Initiatives

- **Electronic Theses and Dissertations.** This archiving system was designed by the UL and is managed by Office of Graduate Studies. ETDs will be searchable by any internet search engine making students' work widely available and also highlighting UNM's intellectual talent.

- The UL is a leader in New Mexico and the region in creating and presenting unique **collections in digital formats**. Also this year, significant reformatting projects included the digitization of motion picture film collections and a pilot project to digitize New Mexico books. Currently, more than 45,000 digitized items are available in the New Mexico Digital Archives.
- The UL continues major involvement with national **scholarly communications** issues and services. DSpace, the official UNM institutional repository, and e-Journal archives in specific global content areas have been very successful. This year, Hemisphere – a new journal of visual arts in the Americas, *Hemisphere*, published by the College of Fine Arts, is now available as a digital archive in UNM’s institutional repository (Dspace). This important resource is now globally available via Google and other search engines. DSpace currently contains over 4,000 collections in 41 UNM communities. The *Searchable Ornithological Research Archive* (<http://elibrary.unm.edu/sora/>), a UNM library developed and unique global resource for ornithology contains 12 journals with over 50,000 articles. In the 2007-08 academic year, it received over 24 million hits.
- The UL added **Self Scanning Stations** which does away with paper and allows students to digitize microform collections and other materials on their own.
- The UL met with UNM’s Accessibility Services and students to discuss the next phase of the remodel of the **Alice Clark Room**.
- Library Information Technology continued to expand the use of automated tools for managing the 550 public and employee computers in the UL system.

Facility Upgrades

- As a result of the fire on April 30, 2006, the **Zimmerman Library basement** has been completely remodeled including a new 40-seat electronic classroom, ten new group study rooms, and efficient and well organized shelving and microformat storage units. This newly remodeled space with comfortable seating, new computers and scanners was opened for student use in March of 2008.
- The first floor of **Zimmerman Library** was remodeled increasing the public space by 5,600 square feet, adding ten group study rooms, doubling the number of PCs available, and increasing the number of laptops for loan
- The new **Fine Arts and Design Library (FADL)** located in the recently dedicated George Pearl Hall opened in February 2008. The new facility nearly doubles the size of the old Fine Arts Library, includes eight group study rooms, a computer classroom, and three times the number of PCs formerly available to students. The staff planned and oversaw the complicated move of library employees and collections into the new space.

Dance collections which had been housed in Zimmerman were moved to FADL. A grand opening celebration was held Spring 2008.

- A comprehensive project to install **compact shelving systems** in the three basement levels of Zimmerman Library was completed Spring 2008. The libraries gained approximately 30,000 linear feet of much needed shelving for its overcrowded collections.
- The installation of a **new entrance and skylights** at Centennial Science & Engineering Library was completed in October 2008. The outside Plaza area above Centennial library was also improved with the installation of new shade sails, replacement outdoor seating, and other upgrades.
- A **computer instruction classroom** was renovated in the lower level of Centennial Science & Engineering Library with 20 computers and a state-of-the-art projection and web conferencing system.
- The first floor of **Parish Memorial Library** was rearranged to increase seating and study space to accommodate the new 24/5 extended hours. New vending machines and a security camera were installed. The basement of Parish Library was also opened to the public until 2am under the extended hours plan and plans are underway to refurbish the area (seating and study spaces) to respond to its increased use.

Community Outreach

- Summer Sunset Lecture Series brought in singer activist Buffy Saint Marie and poet Jimmy Santiago Baca as speakers
- INLP hosted 8 lectures for the Native pathways lecture series. The INLP program also hosted students from the Santa Fe Indian School and instructed them on conducting research.
- CSEL hosted a Patent and Trademark Seminar open to other librarians in the state and to the community.
- The UL Faculty Acknowledgment Series honored a faculty member from each of the main campus colleges.

Future Plans

Strategic Planning

The UL will continue to look for ways to make progress on the four goals in its Strategic Plan for 2006-09 in order to continue the creation of a dynamic library system that plans for and responds to the evolving information and research needs of our students.

- Re-envision the University Libraries as a virtual space and revitalized physical places.
- Evaluate and further develop customer-centered collections.
- Integrate the University Libraries more deeply into the academic culture of UNM.
- All University Libraries' employees are individually valued, understand how their role affects University Libraries' customers, and have the necessary tools and skills to succeed.

A new planning retreat will be scheduled for the spring.

Information and Service Initiatives

- Re-envisioning Centennial Science and Engineering Library to meet the new and future needs of science faculty and students at UNM. Focus group sessions will be held to talk to faculty and students about how they work now and how the library and work with them more closely.
- Outreach Fellows will work in tandem with liaisons in 2009 in pilot departments (history, anthropology, and linguistics) or functions (data creation and management, electronic theses and dissertations) in order to collect data to better understand their information needs. The findings will be used to plan responsive training and services and develop innovative ideas for advancing student success.
- Plans for July 2008-June 2009 include the full implementation of the electronic resources management modules from Serials Solutions, and evaluating additional modules for eBooks, federated search and usage statistics.
- A team will be formed to conduct an RFP for a serials vendor.
- Usability studies for elibrary.unm.edu will be planned and changes to the website will be made to increase ease of use.

Facilities Initiatives

- **Single Service Point.** On January 5, 2009 the UL will launch a new consolidated service point on the first floor in Zimmerman Library. All library services will be available from this point including circulation, information, reference assistance, and referral. The changing needs of students will also be better served through a comprehensive training

program that will ensure all inquiries are answered promptly by knowledgeable staff and student workers.

- Plans are also underway to remodel the first floor of Zimmerman Library for a Learning Commons. Student input has been and will continue to be heavily accessed to ensure the final improvements meet current needs and expectations.
- The UL has been participating in the planning and design of the library for the proposed **UNM West campus** to be located in Rio Rancho. Included in the design is an information commons area equipped with computers, comfortable seating, wireless networking, and computer classroom. Projected opening is January 2010.

Personnel Initiatives

- Due to assignment changes in the Office of the Dean, we see a unique opportunity to bring administrative support services to the next level. We will undergo a series of skills/knowledge assessments and then outline and implement a comprehensive, two-year training plan (both in-service and formal classes) to fill any gaps found in our skill sets.
- We will also initiate a “UL 201 for Administrative Support”, a stepped series of reading assignments and follow up discussions of UL history, facilities, staffing, operations, budget, services, collections, special programs, and technology. This process of training and education will ensure that this unit continually enhances its tools and knowledge to provide excellent support, now, and in the future.
- The Budget and Cost Management (BCM) Unit will participate in new training skills for UNM Jobs, which will Go-Live in January 2009.
- Library Employee Resources, working with the Deputy Dean, will roll-out a comprehensive Leadership Academy taught by UNM Employee Occupational Development. The Academy will include a thirty-eight (38) hour program to train managers in important leadership skills. Approximately 30 UL supervisors/managers will participate, including Dean’s Cabinet and Library Operations Council members. The program kick-off will start in December 2008 and continue through April 2009.
